The Future is What You Make of It



Do you ever wonder what the future holds?

While it's impossible to know or control what will happen in the future, planning is one way to create a secure financial future for you and your loved ones. With a good plan, you can rest easy knowing that your family will be well cared for and your property will pass to your intended beneficiaries.

Why do I need a plan?

Failure to plan may result in accidental disinheritance. Accidental disinheritance occurs when you have no will or your will doesn't function properly. Because failure to plan means you risk harming those you love and subjecting your estate to needless tax, most people need to make a plan for the future.

What are some options for planning my future?

A Will—A will is a written document that permits you to state how you want your property or estate distributed, name an Executor (also called a Personal Representative) to distribute your property, pay debts and taxes, and handle other business affairs to settle your estate.


Living Trust—If you own property, you may wish to set up a living trust. A living trust may be set up during life and directs where your assets go. Unlike a will, a trust will not subject your estate to probate, which is often a lengthy and costly process that requires a court to settle your estate.

A bequest may also help your family save on estate taxes, benefit your favorite charitable organizations, and leave a lasting legacy.

Eunice Singfeldt's Legacy Lives on in Bethel Students

In 2014, Bethel University was in the midst of a fundraising project to build the Wellness Center. In June of that year, Eunice Singfeldt died in Chicago. In her estate plan, she had left \$3 million to Bethel. The gift was a direct answer to prayer. Bethel finished the funding for the Wellness Center with Eunice's gift and was able to break ground in October 2014.

However, Singfeldt's biggest impact at Bethel continues to this day through student scholarships. This year, 29 students were able to attend Bethel thanks to Singfeldt. The former Chicago public elementary school teacher's legacy lives on through the education she's providing Bethel students.
